While Saskatchewan secured constitutional authority over its natural resources in 1930, the application of that control has remained a point of contention between the provincial and federal governments over the years.

The situation has been exacerbated in recent years by the current federal government's continued interference in the province's jurisdiction over natural resources under the guise of federal environmental regulation.

If this continues it will have an extremely detrimental impact, costing Saskatchewan's economy \$111 billion by 2035.

It is therefore time to defend and assert Saskatchewan's economic autonomy by "drawing the line:" taking a number of steps including the introduction of provincial legislation to clarify and protect Saskatchewan's constitutional rights.

Premier Says Provincial Government Will Defend Saskatchewan Economy, Families and Jobs

Premier Scott Moe said his government will take steps to protect Saskatchewan's families, businesses and jobs from destructive federal policies that could cost our province's economy \$111 billion by 2035.

The Government of Saskatchewan released a paper entitled "Drawing the Line: Defending Saskatchewan's Economic Autonomy" which considers policy options in light of the current federal government intrusions into Saskatchewan's exclusive areas of jurisdiction under the Constitution.

Analysis by the Ministry of Finance indicates that nine different federal climate change policies are estimated to cost Saskatchewan's economy \$111 billion between 2023 and 2035.

"The situation has been exacerbated in recent years by the current federal government's continued interference in the province's jurisdiction over natural resources under the guise of federal environmental regulation," Moe said. "It is time to defend and assert Saskatchewan's economic autonomy by 'drawing the line:' taking a number of steps including the introduction of provincial legislation to clarify and protect Saskatchewan's constitutional rights."

In a ruling earlier this year striking down one of those federal policies, *The Impact Assessment Act,* Alberta Chief Justice Catherine Fraser wrote: "Through this legislative scheme, Parliament has taken a wrecking ball to the constitutional rights of the citizens of Alberta and Saskatchewan and other provinces to have their natural resources developed for the benefit."

"This cannot continue," Moe said. "We have so much potential in Saskatchewan to grow and prosper. A strong Saskatchewan means a strong Canada, but we cannot allow continued federal intrusion into our exclusive constitutional right to develop our natural resources and grow our economy. We will defend and protect Saskatchewan jobs and our economic future."



LOWEST UNEMPLOYMENT RATE IN CANADA



Unemployment Rate At 4.1 Per Cent, The Lowest Among The Provinces And 6,000 Jobs Added From A Year Ago

Recently released September 2022 job numbers from Statistics Canada show strong year-over-year job growth in Saskatchewan, with 6,000 jobs added compared to September 2021. All new jobs were full-time employment.

Saskatchewan's unemployment rate fell to 4.1 per cent as of September 2022, the lowest among the provinces, and well below the national average of 5.2 per cent (seasonally adjusted). This change showed a decrease from 6.4 per cent in September 2021, and a decrease from 4.9 per cent in August 2022.

"The Government of Saskatchewan along with our municipalities, businesses and residents remain steadfast in our support for the people of Ukraine as they continue to suffer through this terrible ordeal," Harrison said. "Saskatchewan has a bond with Ukraine, and this ongoing support will continue to strengthen that bond, but more importantly it will improve the lives of those who have faced so much since this conflict began."

"When fires happen, Saskatchewan's professional and volunteer firefighters are ready to respond," Tell said. "When these brave individuals aren't putting their lives on the line to fight fires, they are training and promoting fire prevention in their communities."

The theme for Fire Prevention Week 2022 is "Fire Won't Wait. Plan Your Escape."

"Everyone should have a plan to escape their home in case of a fire, and that plan should be well practiced," Pritchard said. "You and your loved ones might only have a couple minutes to escape. It is crucial to know what to do during a fire."

PHASED TRANSITION OF EMERGENCY SHELTER SPACES IN SASKATOON



The Ministry of Social Services is ensuring the number of emergency shelter spaces in Saskatoon are maintained as it transitions government-funded services from Lighthouse Supported Living.

In October, 30 of the 61 emergency shelter spaces at Lighthouse are transitioning to Salvation Army through an existing contract with the Ministry of Social Services. Discussions with other community partners are underway to plan for the transition of the remaining 31 emergency shelter spaces in the coming weeks.

"A gradual reduction of new referrals to Lighthouse will occur as emergency shelter spaces become operational and with client needs in mind," Social Services Minister Gene Makowsky said. "Our shared focus continues to be to support clients and carefully plan the transition so there is no disruption in service."

"The Salvation Army is pleased to partner with the Ministry of Social Services to increase our short-term emergency shelter spaces in the City of Saskatoon," Salvation Army Major Mike Hoeft said. "We look forward to the ongoing work to address the complex issue of homelessness as we work together to find a long-term solution."

In June 2022, the province announced it would transition government-funded services from Lighthouse Supported Living to other community partners, following challenges with governance, management and financial controls, and safety concerns due to the concentration of services in one location.

Details on upcoming phases of the transition will be communicated as plans are finalized.



Dominic LeBlanc, Minister of Intergovernmental Affairs, Infrastructure and Communities, and Saskatchewan's Government Relations Minister Don McMorris announced more than \$44.6 million in joint funding for 28 infrastructure projects across Saskatchewan.

Among those benefitting from the investments announced today is the City of Meadow Lake. Funding will go toward a recreational, cultural, and community gathering centre for city residents and surrounding communities to enjoy. The centre will feature an NHL-size ice surface, a pleasure rink, and a fieldhouse

with concession stands. An event hall will also be available to host community gatherings such as weddings, funerals, charitable fundraisers and other community events.

South of the Battlefords, the Mosquito Grizzly Bears Head Lean Man First Nation will build a new Interpretive Cultural Art Gallery. It will provide an Indigenous Land, Language and Relational Healing Circle focused on Indigenous mental health and wellbeing. Additionally, the Gallery will share the history and stories of residential schools and survivors and showcase art from First Nations artists from the surrounding communities.







Over the next several weeks, visitors to the Saskatoon Forestry Farm Park & Zoo (Zoo) will start to see the Zoo animals preparing for the cooler winter temperatures ahead. Many species including the snow leopard, lynx, bobcats, bison and caribou thrive in cooler temperatures thanks to some very cool natural adaptations.

"Caribou are well adapted to life in cold climates," says Jeff Mitchell, Zoo Manager. "The herd at the Zoo is already working on developing their dense undercoat made up of ultra-fine fur and a longer overcoat of hollow guard hairs that will keep them warm throughout the winter. Caribou also have large, sharp hooves that act like snowshoes allowing them to walk on top of the snow."

Other animals like the grizzly bears and prairie dogs, are getting ready to sleep away the cold winter days.

"Mistaya and Koda have started making their beds so to speak," says Mitchell. "You might see the bears combing through the extra straw and leaves the zookeepers have placed throughout their habitat. Mistaya and Koda like to carefully select each leaf and piece of straw, only taking the best of the best back to their den to make their bed."

Dingoes Maple and Euci will soon be off-exhibit as the cool weather settles in. While the dingoes love to

play in the snow for brief periods of time, they will be spending most of their time in their indoor habitat in favour of warmer temperatures.

SASKATOON GREEN CART PROGRAM



Here are a few things to remember when managing your yard waste this fall. What goes in your cart?

Leaves, grass clippings, garden refuse, twigs (smaller than your finger in diameter and no longer than an arm's length), weeds, wood chips and bark mulch, fallen elm leaves, pine and spruce cones and needles, household plants (including soil).

Cart filling up too fast?

Leave grass clippings on your lawn after mowing, also known as "grasscycling." Work leaves directly into your garden soil or use them as mulch on your garden beds. Take excess yard waste to a City compost depot, free of charge. Set up a backyard composting system.

IMPORTANT REMINDER

The annual Elm tree pruning ban was lifted as of September 1, 2020. Fallen Elm leaves are permitted in

your Green Cart, however, Elm branches and Elm wood are prohibited from your Green Cart and the City compost depots.


