#### APRIL EXCITEMENT AT THE ROYAL SASKATCHEWAN MUSEUM



April is an exciting month at the Royal Saskatchewan Museum (RSM). The museum was recognized with a special award, visitation has hit record highs, and there are many great events and programs just around the corner.

On April 5, the RSM was awarded the Saskatchewan Tourism Awards of Excellence Gil Carduner Marketing Award for the Saskatchewan Fossil Campaign. This campaign, which led to the selection of the T. rex as a new provincial emblem, successfully reached a number of target markets and resulted in an increase in visitation, website traffic and social media engagement. The RSM saw 139,122 visitors in 2016/17, a 19 per cent increase over 2015/16 and a 28 per cent increase over the ten year average. In fact, this is the highest visitation the museum has seen in 20 years.

"I am so proud of the achievements the Royal Saskatchewan Museum has made over the past year," Parks, Culture and Sport Minister Ken Cheveldayoff said. "I know that the talented staff at the museum will build on the momentum and continue to positively contribute to the quality of life here in Saskatchewan."

There are many areas of Saskatchewan's already diverse economy that are strong and getting stronger. For example, new numbers show manufacturing sales in Saskatchewan are up nearly 23% over last year. Building permits are up 10%, housing starts are up 50%, and Saskatchewan's population continues to grow at a pace our province hasn't seen in 90 years.

Saskatchewan had Canada's best job creation record in February, followed by another strong month in March. Our retail sales and new vehicle sales growth is second-best in the country with our capital investment growth third best in all of Canada. The oil industry is even showing signs of recovery. New well drilling doubled in the first quarter of this year compared with last year.

As we work to meet the challenge of persistently low commodity prices, our economy is growing stronger. You can learn more about our three-year plan to balance the budget, maintain the Saskatchewan Advantage and keep our economy strong at saskatchewan.ca/budget.

Saskatchewan has long championed a Canadian market that is open and transparent and which allows our businesses to compete fairly and freely across the country. The new Canadian Free Trade Agreement (CFTA) is going to level the playing field for Saskatchewan.

The agreement replaces the existing Agreement on Internal Trade, which has been in place since 1995. The new agreement establishes free trade rules that apply across the Canadian economy, unlike the old agreement which covered only 11 sectors of the economy.

Taking effect July 1<sup>st</sup>, the new CFTA will greatly reduce barriers to trade, investment and worker mobility, benefiting businesses, workers and consumers by expanding procurement opportunities in other parts of the country and by ensuring labour mobility for our workers.

While there is still some more work to do in areas like alcoholic beverages and financial services, we have reached a balanced agreement that serves us well by cutting red tape and barriers to trade. The result will be more opportunities for Saskatchewan's economy to diversify and grow.

We want to ensure that victims of violent crime and their family members receive the supports they need. That is why our government has introduced and passed legislation to support individuals fleeing interpersonal violence and families of victims of crime.

Changes to The Victims of Interpersonal Violence Act and The Residential Tenancies Act, 2006 allow a tenant to end a fixed-term rental agreement with 28 days' notice if they or their family members are being abused by another resident or former resident.

The fact that an individual has signed, for example, a year-long lease will no longer factor into their decision to leave a violent domestic situation.

Amendments to The Victims of Crime Act, 1995 also expand compensation for counselling costs.

Previously, the legislation limited compensation for counselling to the spouse or children of an adult victim and the parent or sibling of a child victim. It now includes parents, siblings, and adult children of adult victims who have died as a result of violent crime.

Recognizing that Saskatchewan has the highest rate of domestic violence in Canada, we will continue to explore options to help address this serious issue.

Our government has also introduced and passed legislation improving safety for tow truck operators. *The Traffic Safety (Tow Trucks) Amendment Act, 2017* allows for blue lights to be used in conjunction with amber lights on tow trucks.

Passed with unanimous support the day it was introduced, the legislation comes after tow truck operator Courtney Schaefer was killed in a March 7, 2017 collision along the roadside in the Gerald area during blizzard conditions.

Saskatchewan is the first jurisdiction in Canada to introduce a two-colour lighting combination for tow trucks. The addition of blue lights isn't mandatory but adding them will increase visibility, heighten awareness and increase safety.

Tow truck operators will be able to install blue lights once the bill receives royal assent and is proclaimed later this spring. SGI will be undertaking public awareness efforts to educate the public about blue lights on tow trucks.

It's the law to slow to 60 km/h when passing tow trucks and any emergency vehicles on the highway when flashing lights are engaged.

# GOVERNMENT, SARCAN AND SASKMILK REMIND RESIDENTS TO RECYCLE MILK CONTAINERS



Environment Minister Scott Moe joined representatives from SARCAN and SaskMilk at the East Regina SARCAN depot today to remind Saskatchewan residents that milk containers are now included in the provincial recycling program.

As of April 1, residents can return 'ready-to-serve' milk containers to any of SARCAN's 72 depots to receive a refund of the deposit paid at the point of purchase.

"SARCAN does a great job of running the beverage container recycling program, and through their efforts more than 80 per cent of containers are returned," Moe said. "We have a great partnership with SARCAN and we are pleased to add milk containers to this important program."

The new refundable deposits for milk containers are:

- \$0.10 for plastic milk containers, paper milk cartons or tetra boxes, between one and 999 ml.
- \$0.25 for plastic milk containers, paper milk cartons or tetra boxes, one litre or more.

#### **SPRING YARD SAFETY**



Spring is the perfect time and perfect weather to spend outside getting your yard and outdoor spaces in tip-top shape. But before you head outside, read some simple precautions that can ensure your spring-spruce up is disaster free.

- 1- Know your equipment. Before operating a new lawn mower read the owner's manual and all of the safety information. Ditto for your weed trimmer. Check with the manufacturer of your tools to make sure there haven't been any safety recalls.
- 2- Practice Ladder Safety. You've heard it again and again, but always check to make sure your ladder is firmly set on a level surface. Never set ladders on boxes or other objects to make the ladder reach higher areas. Lock or barricade any doors that may open toward ladders. Also, never stand on the top rung or step of a ladder your balance could be jeopardized.
- 3- Watch your children. Every year, thousands of children nationwide are injured by lawn-care tools. That's why it is recommended keeping small children inside while you're mowing or trimming. At a minimum, do not allow children younger than 12 to operate a push lawn mower and anyone under the age of 16 to operate a driving lawn mower. Do not take children on rides with a riding mower.
- 4- Check your extension cords. Before use, check your extension cords for cracks and seal them with electrical tape. If you find any frayed wires, replace the cord. And remember, never run extension cords through puddles.
- 5- Protect your body. This one is simple: wear protective gear. We all know that lawnmowers hit rocks, sticks and other items that can be turned into flying projectiles. Wear long pants to protect your legs from flying objects and wear non-slip, closed toe shoes instead of sandals. Don't forget your eyes and ears! Sunglasses will protect you from sun and earplugs can eliminate loud noises from machinery that could cause a substantial amount of hearing loss.

- 6- Store tools and materials in safe places. A range of injury can be caused by stepping on, landing on or being hit with garden tools like shovels, rakes and trowels. Do not use these tools when in close proximity to children. When not in use, store them in safe, enclosed areas. If you have small children or pets, weed killer or lawn fertilizer can be deadly. Seal bags and store at heights where small children cannot get in to potentially harmful materials.
- 7- Don't dig without approval. Check with your local utility companies before you dig trenches, holes or any other cavity in your yard. You do not want to be responsible for accidentally hitting gas, electrical or sewer lines the results of which can be extremely hazardous, not to mention expensive.
- 8- Be conscious of electricity. Don't leave electrical tools plugged in while not in use. When ready to use a tool, make sure equipment is in the off position before you plug it in. And, as is obvious, always turn equipment off and unplug it from an outlet before you attempt to fix the machinery.
- 9- Get green smart. Before you or your children do any "hands on" weed removal, be sure you know how to identify poison ivy, sumac, oak and similar toxic plants. Find out ahead of time how to treat the rashes they cause to reduce the irritation.

SASKATCHEWAN RECORDS STRONG MANUFACTURING SALES

GROWTH



Manufacturing sales in Saskatchewan increased by 22.7 per cent in February 2017, compared to the previous year (seasonally adjusted). This was the second highest percentage increase among the provinces—significantly higher than the national average of 6.8 per cent.

"Once again, Saskatchewan has experienced strong growth in manufacturing sales, leading the west and well above Canada's average," Economy Minister Jeremy Harrison said. "These numbers point to a manufacturing sector that is strong and resilient, offering a diversity of high quality products to markets across Canada and the world."

On a monthly basis, Saskatchewan's manufacturing sales were up by 0.4 per cent, compared to January 2017 (seasonally adjusted). The province ranked second in percentage growth in western Canada and third among all provinces.

Areas with major gains on an annual basis (seasonally adjusted) were chemical manufacturing, food manufacturing and wood manufacturing, with increases of 21.7 per cent, 19.1 per cent, and 16.9 per cent respectively.

# CONSTRUCTION BEGINS ON MARTENSVILLE AND WARMAN OVERPASSES

People living in Martensville and Warman are one step closer to safer highway access to their communities. Construction is now underway on a \$60.6 million project to build overpasses on Highway 11 near Warman and Highway 12 at Martensville.

"Strategic infrastructure investments help address congestion and bottlenecks along vital transportation corridors, and around hubs and ports," said Ralph Goodale, federal Minister of Public Safety and Emergency Preparedness on behalf of Amarjeet Sohi, Minister of Infrastructure and Communities. "Investing in projects such as these interchanges in Martensville and Warman will help shorten travel times and improve access to world markets, bolstering economic growth and the prosperity of the middle class and all those working hard to get there."

"Investing in infrastructure is a priority for the Government of Saskatchewan," Highways and Infrastructure Minister David Marit said. "Warman and Martensville are Saskatchewan's fastest growing communities, and we believe the improved safety and efficiency the new overpasses provide will help this region continue to grow and thrive into the future."
