# THE CONCLUSION OF THE FALL SITTING OF THE LEGISLATURE MARKED THE END OF AN ERA IN SASKATCHEWAN



The conclusion of the Fall Sitting of the Legislature marked the end of an era in Saskatchewan as it was final sitting for Premier Brad Wall.

Premier Wall was elected on a vision for Saskatchewan that would secure a better quality of life for its residents. Saskatchewan has seen that vision unfold during a decade of growth in which we emerged as the second-fastest growing province in Canada with a population of 1.15 million.

During that time, our growing province produced the second-best job creation record in Canada – nearly double the national rate of job growth.

The growth of our province under the leadership of Premier Brad Wall has enabled us to provide record tax relief for low-income individuals and families.

Through strategic investments we have been able to recruit and retain 750 more doctors, over 3,000 more nurses, and we have been able to reduce surgical wait times to among the shortest in Canada.

Investments in hospital projects have doubled. This includes the new Children's Hospital in Saskatoon and the new hospitals in Moose Jaw and North Battleford.

We have opened 15 new long-term care facilities for seniors across the province and have tripled the Seniors Income Plan benefit from \$90 to 270 per month.

Today there are 40 brand-new or replacement schools with investments in 25 other major school renovations.

We have hired 875 more teachers and 164 more student support teachers.

With enrolment growth of 10 per cent, we have also increased K-12 operating funding by 32 per cent.

Operating and capital funding for post-secondary institutions has increased by 40 per cent over 10 years.

We have added 6,000 new childcare spaces.

And we have more than doubled revenue sharing funding to municipalities from \$127 million in 2007 to \$258 million in 2017-18.

Growth has always been, and always will be, the north star for our government.

It's all about securing a better quality of life for all Saskatchewan people. Together, by this

measure, we have had some success.

#### CHRISTMAS MESSAGE FROM PREMIER BRAD WALL

In 1913, a young immigrant, his name was John, who was a husband and father of three, left behind the oppression of his country forever. He also left behind his family, for what he knew might be an extended period of time.

Despite the fears he must have felt for his family, he set out to cross the ocean. To find a place of hope for their future. He came to Saskatchewan.

It took him nine years. He worked hard and he saved hard.

Those nine years were not without hardship and tragedy. And when they were over he no longer had three children. His daughter had died in the influenza epidemic of 1915. Only his two sons remained.

What a bittersweet family reunion it must have been, when he managed to send enough money to bring his wife and two sons to join him. Despite their loss and their difficulties their story is still about hope.

Hope that was stronger than the fear of what they had to endure. They saw Saskatchewan as a place to build their future. And turn that dream into reality.

Despite the adversities in the lives of that young immigrant family, that first Saskatchewan Christmas must have been a great celebration.

There was probably not a great deal of wealth in gifts or a great table spread, but there must have been a great deal of wealth and fulfillment in simply being together. And there must have been renewed optimism for the new year dawning.

That has been what we have dared to dream in our province for the last 10 years. That Saskatchewan's story would be about optimism and hope again. And that hope would be stronger than the fear that we aren't good enough, or fear of the unknown.

Instead, we dreamed of a Saskatchewan that would bring our kids home. A Saskatchewan that had confidence in what we have to offer to a new wave and a new generation of immigrants just like John.

Together, that's what we have done.

In 2017, a hundred years later, that immigrant family's descendants still live in Saskatchewan.

John's great grandson and his family will come together in just a few weeks for a traditional ranch Christmas...all because of one man's determination and sacrifice. And because of a place of hope, like Saskatchewan.

And this Christmas, new comers from the world over will enjoy the holidays in their own way here in Saskatchewan. Because in the last 10 years, newcomers have again found hope here and chose Saskatchewan in record numbers.

To live without fear and to dream of a better future. May we always have that freedom. And may we always have the freedom to celebrate Christmas.

Christmas is the ultimate story of hope because that's what God gave to us all. He sent His son Jesus.

As a tiny baby, He left perfection to endure oppression.

Because He loved us. And chose to bring us that hope. That's what I believe this Christmas.

It's the time of year to enjoy the wealth of simply being together with those we love, and the fulfillment of helping someone in need.

And it's the time of year when we are all reminded of the need to spread that hope and love God sent to us. To share it with those around us, especially those in need.

So from me and my wife Tami, and our family, and on behalf of my colleagues in the Government of Saskatchewan may the Miracle of Christmas bless you, and the True Spirit of Christmas keep you.

### **CHRISTMAS MESSAGE FROM THE LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR**

It is my prayer that we will work together to create more inclusive communities, where everyone is welcome. Only we have the power to create the change we need in our country.

Over the past six years, I have presented hundreds of awards to deserving individuals. There are many more who may not receive public recognition, but who give of their time and their resources to improve the lives of others. To all the generous and capable Saskatchewan volunteers, I thank you, from the bottom of my heart, for making our province better. You are proof that we are each able to make a difference, and that when we work together, no challenge is too great.

One of the things I love most about this time of year is spending time with my family. I also love Christmas Carols. I'd like share a few lyrics from one of my favorites.



## CITYWIDE NOTIFYNOW TEST SUCCESSFUL; RESIDENTS BECOMING MORE FAMILIAR WITH SIGN-UP PROCESS



City of Saskatoon News release: December 6th, the notifynow TEST message sent by the City of Saskatoon's Emergency Measures Organization (EMO) was once again a success based on the feedback from residents and program delivery results.

"Residents that called in yesterday after the TEST message wanted to learn more about how to sign up to customize their notifynow profile, says Deb Davies, Acting Director of Emergency Planning. "Residents are recognizing that in the event of a wide-scale emergency, or one affecting only their neighborhood, they might prefer a text message, <u>and</u> an email <u>in addition</u> to receiving a voice message to their landline. Or maybe they want to make sure their children receive a text message. That's what is great about the notifynow emergency messaging system; people can customize their profile and tell us how best to contact them and their family members."

To date, 22,470 residents have gone online to customize their preferred communication method. With the twice-yearly testing of the notifynow system, and by creating ongoing awareness for the program, the City's EMO hopes to continue to grow this number.

"Testing the system helps to familiarize residents with what a notifynow message will sound like and how it will be displayed on their phones or their other preferred methods of communication they've let us know about by signing up," says Davies. "Testing helps residents know that a timely and targeted notifynow message is legitimate - and should be trusted. Should a resident receive a notifynow safety message, they'll know what to do, where to go, and what to expect in an impending, escalating, or occurring emergency situation in Saskatoon. We ask that people save the contact in their address books and cell phones as notifynow for easier identification.

The ability to receive timely emergency communications is critical for all people, including the deaf and hard of hearing. The TEST yesterday sent messages to 86 TTY devices; again, the EMO hopes to continue to see this number grow. To receive *accessible* notifynow messages, sign up and enter up to two different TTY electronic device methods for text communication via telephone.

SASKATCHEWAN RECOGNIZES NATIONAL DAY OF REMEMBRANCE AND ACTION ON VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN

December 6, 2017 - As Canadians mark the *National Day of Remembrance and Action on Violence Against Women* today, the Government of Saskatchewan remains committed to finding effective solutions to reduce interpersonal violence and abuse.

In Canada, December 6 commemorates the deaths of 14 female engineering students who, in 1989, were targeted and killed at Montreal's Ecole Polytechnique simply because they were women. This year marks the 28th anniversary of that tragic event.

"Today is an opportunity to remember all women and girls who have died as a result of violence and who currently face violence in their lives," Minister Responsible for the Status of Women Bronwyn Eyre said. "It is important that we use our collective voice to raise awareness and support violence prevention in our communities."

In 1991, the white ribbon campaign was established to raise awareness about, and oppose, violence against women and girls. The campaign also works to promote gender equity.

Today, all Saskatchewan MLAs will wear a white ribbon to pledge their support to end violence against women and girls and mark the importance of December 6.

## PDAP TO PROVIDE ASSISTANCE ON GRAZING LANDS DAMAGED BY WILDFIRES

December 6th, Government Relations Minister Larry Doke announced that the Provincial Disaster Assistance Program (PDAP) will provide financial assistance to grazing lands damaged by wildfires.

"Typically PDAP does not provide assistance for wildfire losses, because most fire losses are insurable," Doke said. "However, tame and native grazing lands are not insurable. This adjustment will fill that gap and provide Saskatchewan producers with additional peace of mind, and help ensure that operations affected by wildfire can recover sooner."

Producers that have suffered wildfire damages to "tame and native lands" intended for grazing can now apply for assistance providing feed to affected livestock. A claimant must meet all the program's eligibility criteria which can be found at www.saskatchewan.ca/PDAP#eligibility.

#### **GOVERNMENT CREATES INTERPERSONAL VIOLENCE LEAVE**

New Legislation Will Support Survivors of Interpersonal Violence

Over the last year, the Ministries of Justice, Social Services and Labour Relations and Workplace Safety have engaged in consultations to determine what supports are needed to combat the issue of interpersonal violence in Saskatchewan.

The result is a job protected leave that can be taken immediately after the legislation receives Royal Asset, which is expected on December 7, 2017.

The Saskatchewan Employment (Interpersonal Violence Leave) Amendment Act, 2017, provides survivors of interpersonal violence with 10 days of unpaid leave to access services or to relocate.

"We know that Saskatchewan has one of the highest rates of police-reported interpersonal violence across Canada," Labour Relations and Workplace Safety Minister Don Morgan said. "As government and other agencies work toward long-term solutions for this issue, survivors need immediate supports to escape dangerous situations."

### HEALTH CARDS NEED TO BE UPDATED WITH NEW STICKERS BY DECEMBER 31, 2017



Residents with provincial health coverage who have not received their health card renewal stickers in the mail are encouraged to contact eHealth Saskatchewan (eHealth) as soon as possible. Most health cards expire on December 31, 2017.

If an individual's health card expires, he or she could be billed for medical services.

This fall, eHealth mailed health card renewal packages to all residents with provincial health coverage. The packages included updated stickers that will renew health cards for a three year period, until December 31, 2020. Residents who have not received a package should call eHealth at 1-800-667-7551, email Change@eHealthSask.ca, or visit eHealth's office located at 2130 - 11th Avenue in downtown Regina to receive their renewal sticker.

eHealth's office is open Monday to Friday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., except on statutory holidays,

including December 25, 26 and January 1.

The most common reason why people do not receive their renewal stickers is because they have moved and not updated their address with eHealth Saskatchewan. Residents can update their address, as well as personal and family information, online at www.eHealthSask.ca.

### KEEP RECYCLING AND WASTE REDUCTION IN MIND THIS HOLIDAY SEASON



City of Saskatoon: This holiday season the City of Saskatoon is encouraging residents to keep recycling options in mind.

"We know that the holidays are a time where our community generates a greater amount of garbage than normal. Our 'Create Memories, Not Garbage' campaign is an opportunity for us share a gentle waste reduction message," says Brenda Wallace, Director of Environmental and Corporate Initiatives. "Recycling and composting are important successes for our community, and it's also important that we start thinking about waste reduction year-round."

Wallace says almost 100,000 tonnes of garbage is added to the landfill each year and waste reduction is a critical component to deferring the replacement of the landfill. The costs to close the existing landfill and establish a new landfill are estimated at \$26 million and \$100 million respectively.

Here are some recycling and waste reduction suggestions for the holidays:


- Wrapping gifts with reusable materials
- Gifts with less packaging
- Gifts without packaging such as a Leisure Gift Card or tickets to a performance
- Gifts of time participating in one of Saskatoon's many winter activities
- Gifts of food in reusable or recyclable containers

This is the first year that the City of Saskatoon has conducted a holiday waste reduction campaign. The campaign, built upon Metro Vancouver's yearly waste reduction campaign will run on social media until January.

The campaign supports the Strategic Goal of Environmental Leadership including the four-year priority to promote and facilitate city-wide composting and recycling and the long-term strategy to eliminate the need for a new landfill and to reduce greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions tied to City operations. In addition, it supports the Waste Diversion Performance Target to divert 70% of waste by 2023.


