**GOVERNMENTS INVEST \$11 MILLION TO SUPPORT
AGRICULTURE CROP RESEARCH**



Premier Scott Moe, "Today, Minister of Agriculture David Marit and Minister Marie Claude Bibeau announced \$11 million in funding under the Canadian Agricultural Partnership. This funding will advance 47 crop-related research projects in Saskatchewan, supporting producers and agribusinesses in our province's role as a world leader in agriculture research."

Federal Minister of Agriculture and Agri-Food Marie Claude Bibeau and Saskatchewan Agriculture Minister David Marit announced \$11 million in funding under the Canadian Agricultural Partnership for 47 crop-related research projects through Saskatchewan's Agriculture Development Fund (ADF).

The ADF program is supported through the Canadian Agricultural Partnership, a five-year, \$388 million investment in strategic initiatives for Saskatchewan agriculture by the federal and provincial governments.

"Producers reap huge rewards from the new knowledge and discoveries developed by research – they become more profitable and more productive," said Bibeau. "By investing in applied research

relevant to Saskatchewan producers' needs, we are increasing the competitiveness of our industry.”

“We’re strategically investing in crop-related research that will increase our industry capacity, driving toward our goal of increasing crop production to 45 million metric tonnes,” Marit said. “The research we’re investing in includes projects that explore how to manage clubroot, mitigate herbicide resistance and add value to our commodities. These projects will support producers and agribusinesses and help secure our place as a world leader in agriculture research.”

**SASKATCHEWAN RATTLERS ANNOUNCE BARRY RAWLYK
AS GENERAL MANAGER**

January 9th, I was pleased to attend the media announcement naming Barry Rawlyk as General Manager of the Saskatchewan Rattlers.

The Saskatchewan Rattlers, member club of the [Canadian Elite Basketball League \(CEBL\)](#), are elated to announce Barry Rawlyk as their second General Manager in franchise history. Rawlyk is no stranger to the Rattlers, having served the 2019 Championship season as the lead assistant coach as well as assisting in the recruitment of the roster.

He joins the Rattlers as the current University of Saskatchewan Huskies men's basketball team head coach. As the sixth head coach in University of Saskatchewan men's basketball history, Rawlyk took the helm in an interim position in the 2010-11 season. In May 2012, he was officially named head coach of the men's basketball program.

During the 2010-11 season, Rawlyk led the Huskies to a fourth place finish at the CIS Championship and a second place finish in Canada West. The following season, the team finished first in their conference and hosted the Canada West Final Four for the first time in the program's history. Prior to joining the Huskies, Rawlyk spent over two decades coaching at Holy Cross High School in Saskatoon. During his time with the Crusaders, he led them to 11 City Championship titles as well as three Provincial Championships.

The Saskatoon native will start assembling the Rattlers 2020 roster when CEBL free agency starts on Feb. 1. The Rattlers head coach announcement is expected at the end of January. "We couldn't be more excited to have Barry join the Rattlers as the General Manager," says Rattlers President and

COO, Lee Genier.

“Barry has an extensive track record of building winning teams full of high-character individuals who not only excel on the court, but also in the community. We are prepared to enter free agency with a focused plan of attack that will give us the best possible chance to build another championship team in 2020.”

The Rattlers enter the 2020 season as the defending CEBL Champions. They will open the season away from home on May 8 when they take on the Fraser Valley Bandits. The Rattlers home opener will take place on May 14 against the Bandits, when they will celebrate the 2019 season by unveiling the first-ever CEBL Championship banner. Season tickets are available on therattlers.ca, with group tickets, flex packs and single game tickets expected to be released in the coming months.

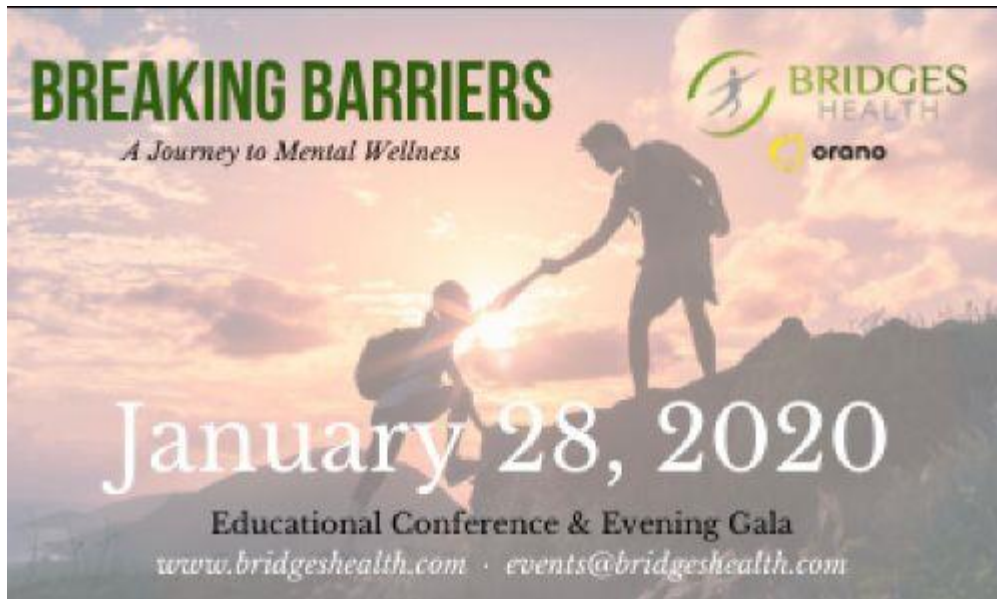

VIGIL HELD IN SASKATOON FOR PLANE CRASH VICTIMS

I joined many who attended the vigil held in Saskatoon following the tragic plane crash in Iran. Each story I've read and heard about is absolutely heartbreaking. Sincere and heartfelt sympathy to friends and families of all those who lost loved ones in this tragedy. Please read the thought of the day in this newsletter. It seems fitting after this terrible tragedy.

[CTV News Saskatoon, January 10](#) - The Persian Student Association held a vigil at the University of Saskatchewan on Friday for the victims of the Ukrainian International Airlines flight that crashed in Iran this week.

“This is my family, the people that are here are my family out of the country and the way that Iranians are raised, you are told that everyone in the community is your brother or sister,” organizer Amir Abolhassani said.

All 176 people on board the plane were killed after it crashed in a field outside Tehran shortly after takeoff, including 57 Canadians.

None of the victims have been identified as Saskatchewan residents, but the university has a large number of Iranian students attending classes on campus.

One of the victims was U of S researcher Marzieh (Mari) Foroutan. Though Foroutan was based at the University of Waterloo, she was part of Global Water Futures — a U of S led research program.

Check out [Tourism Saskatoon](#) for the complete story. Saskatonians love to hang out and dine together – in fact, we have more restaurants per capita here than anywhere else in Canada. It's a classic date-night activity. But sometimes, it's fun to change things up and head out somewhere that isn't focused on food and drinks.

During the winter months especially, it can be a little tricky to plan places to go to spend some quality time with your significant other.

Here are some places to check out for some good wholesome fun.

1. **Campus Observatory** - A romantic way to spend the night with your partner is to show them the stars and planets. [The University of Saskatchewan Campus Observatory](#) is open to the public free of charge most Saturday nights. (They also offer private tours that can be booked in advance on Sunday through Friday evenings). The observatory has a refracting telescope which means you'll be able to see planets, nebulae, star clusters, galaxies and even comets on your night out.
2. **Saskatoon's Newest Golf Lounge** - One of Saskatoon's first golf simulator lounges, [YXE Golf Lounge](#), opened this fall in Saskatoon and I went to check it out.
3. **Indoor Rock Climbing** - [Grip It](#) is one of the province's premier rock climbing facilities and is a top rope, lead and boulder gym. But even if you've never climbed before, they're set up to drop in anytime with their auto-belay systems (so you don't need a partner to hold your rope and you can both have fun climbing).
4. **An Escape Room** - Escape rooms are such a fun way to spend date night – especially when considering you're locked in a room together. The race against time to figure out the puzzle is a great way to work in tandem with your partner. Check out [Breakout Escape Game & Lounge](#).
5. **The Stoked Centre** - [The Stoked Centre](#) offers a few different activities to try like their indoor electric go-karts which go up to 45 kilometres an hour or the world's first 220-degree, 200-foot zipline and ropes course. There's also an arcade coming soon to make it a perfect way to spend the afternoon.
6. **Skate Night** - The [Cameco Meewasin Rink @Nutrien Plaza](#) is a wonderful location to go skating. A bonus is the free rentals (a donation is recommended) as well as the indoor warm-up shelter.
7. **Boffins Public Garden** - A quieter and very romantic location to take your date is skating at [Boffins Public Garden](#) at Innovation Place on campus at the University of Saskatchewan. Their summertime pond turns into a gorgeous outdoor skating rink with twinkle lights strung through the trees all around the Japanese gardens.

48 COMMUNITIES TO BENEFIT FROM TRAFFIC SAFETY FUND GRANTS

Traffic safety projects in 48 communities across Saskatchewan have been approved for funding from the proceeds of photo speed enforcement (PSE).

The PSE committee has awarded the second round of Provincial Traffic Safety Fund grants, providing a total of \$500,000 to improve safety in Saskatchewan. These include intersection and crosswalk improvements, speed display signs, pedestrian crossing signals, school zone beacons and other speed-reduction initiatives.

Grants from this round range from \$850 to just over \$37,000.

“These projects will help calm traffic and make Saskatchewan roads safer,” Minister Responsible for SGI Joe Hargrave said. “I want to congratulate the successful applicants and express how pleased I am that so many communities are keeping traffic safety top of mind and have taken the initiative to make improvements to keep their citizens safe. I continue to encourage other municipalities and Indigenous lands or territories to consider applying for these grants for their own safety initiatives.”

10,400 NEW JOBS CREATED IN 2019



Saskatchewan Saw A Year Of Strong Job Growth In 2019 - According to new Statistics Canada data, Saskatchewan saw an increase of 10,400 jobs, or 1.8 per cent, from 2018 to 580,400 jobs. More than half of that job growth is due to full-time jobs.

Saskatchewan's annual unemployment rate was the fourth lowest among provinces at 5.4 per cent and remained below the national rate of 5.7 per cent in 2019.

"In spite of external headwinds, the creation of 10,400 jobs in 2019 is an indication that Saskatchewan has a robust, diverse and growing economy," Immigration and Career Training Minister Jeremy Harrison said. "Saskatchewan's growth plan set an ambitious target of 100,000 new jobs by 2030, last year's job growth shows that this target is reachable and well on its way of being met."

December 2019 also marked the 17th consecutive month of job growth on a year-over-year basis.

In December 2019, there were 579,900 people employed, an increase of 6,700 jobs over December 2018. Saskatchewan's monthly unemployment rate was 5.7 per cent (seasonally adjusted) in December 2019, down from 5.8 per cent in November 2019.

Other December 2019 highlights:

- Record highs for the month of December for labour force (612,000 persons), employment (579,900 jobs), full-time employment (470,000 jobs) and female employment (269,300 jobs);
- Off-reserve Aboriginal employment increased by 4,400 jobs (+9.8 per cent) and Aboriginal youth employment was up 3,200 jobs (+45.1 per cent);
- Major year-over-year gains were reported for information, culture and recreation up 3,500 jobs; accommodation and food services up 3,500 jobs; and manufacturing up 3,100 jobs; and
- Female employment was up 3,100 jobs (+1.2 per cent) and youth employment up 1,500 jobs (+2.1 per cent) compared to last December.

INNOVATION SASKATCHEWAN ANNOUNCES NEW CEO

Harvey has dedicated more than 25 years to the public service, which has included senior leadership roles in the Ministries of Agriculture, Health and Intergovernmental Affairs. Most recently she has served as the Acting CEO and Chief Operating Officer of Innovation Saskatchewan.

“Kari’s work with our entrepreneurial ecosystem has created trust and co-operation among a sector that is critical to our economic growth,” Beaudry-Mellor said. “I am excited to work with her to deliver on the targets of the Growth Plan and to push for Saskatchewan’s growing recognition as a tech leader both nationally and internationally.”

The Government of Saskatchewan is taking bold steps to ensure Saskatchewan’s tech-sector stays strong during the next 10 years of growth. Tripling the tech-sector by 2030 by aggressively pursuing new measures to retain and attract large scale tech employers will help ensure Saskatchewan is on the right path with a modern economy.

In 2017 Innovation Saskatchewan launched Co.Labs, a provincially backed incubator which in less than three years has created 160 jobs, incubated 88 start-ups and secured more than \$8 million in investment. Saskatchewan also offers the Saskatchewan Technology Startup Incentive, the most aggressive tech angel investment incentive program in Western Canada.

TAX FILING MADE EASIER, LESS COSTLY FOR SASKATCHEWAN BUSINESSES

The government is continuing its efforts to cut red tape, making Saskatchewan more attractive for small- and medium-sized businesses.

As one of the first red-tape reduction initiatives of the new year, Saskatchewan is raising threshold amounts for businesses that file returns for the Provincial Sales Tax (PST), Liquor Consumption Tax (LCT), and Beverage Container Program. In addition, due dates for electronic filers are being extended.

“These changes will make tax filings easier for Saskatchewan businesses and reduce their administrative costs,” Red Tape Reduction Committee Chair Gene Makowsky said on behalf of Finance Minister Donna Harpauer. “The changes also provide more incentive for businesses to switch to electronic filing.”

Effective April 1, 2020:

- the threshold for annual filing of PST, LCT, and beverage container returns will increase to \$4,800 (from \$3,600);
- the threshold for quarterly filing will increase to a range of \$4,800 to \$12,000 (from \$3,600 to \$7,200); and
- the threshold for monthly filing will increase to \$12,000 (from \$7,200).

NEXT ROUND OF ONLINE AUCTIONS FOR RETAIL LIQUOR PERMITS SET TO OPEN

The second round of auctions for available retail liquor store permits in Saskatchewan begins January 21 with bids closing on January 31.

Communities included in the second round of auctions are the Rural Municipality (RM) of Blucher, Carlyle, RM of Corman Park, Esterhazy, Gull Lake, RM of Kindersley, Langham, RM of Longlaketon, Regina Beach, RM of Shellbrook, Unity and White City.

“There was strong interest during the initial online auction for permits that concluded in December,” Minister Responsible for the Saskatchewan Liquor and Gaming Authority Gene Makowsky said. “The auction process has worked well and ensures that available liquor permits in the province are allocated efficiently and transparently.”

Each auction will have an opening bid of \$1,000 and interested bidders are required to register at www.McDougallBay.com, which is the website where all bidding will take place.

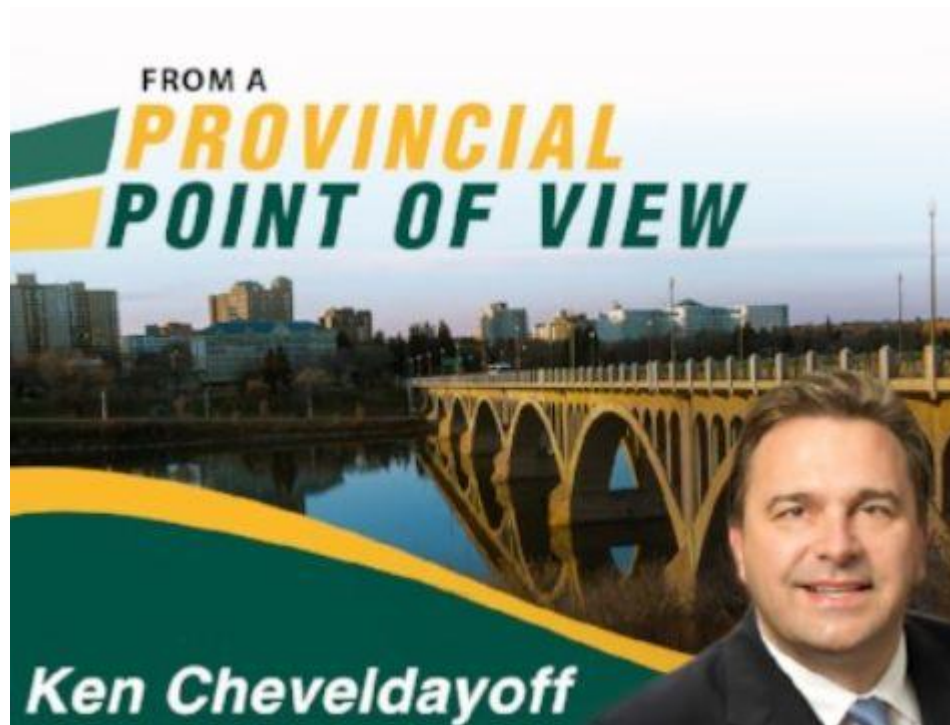

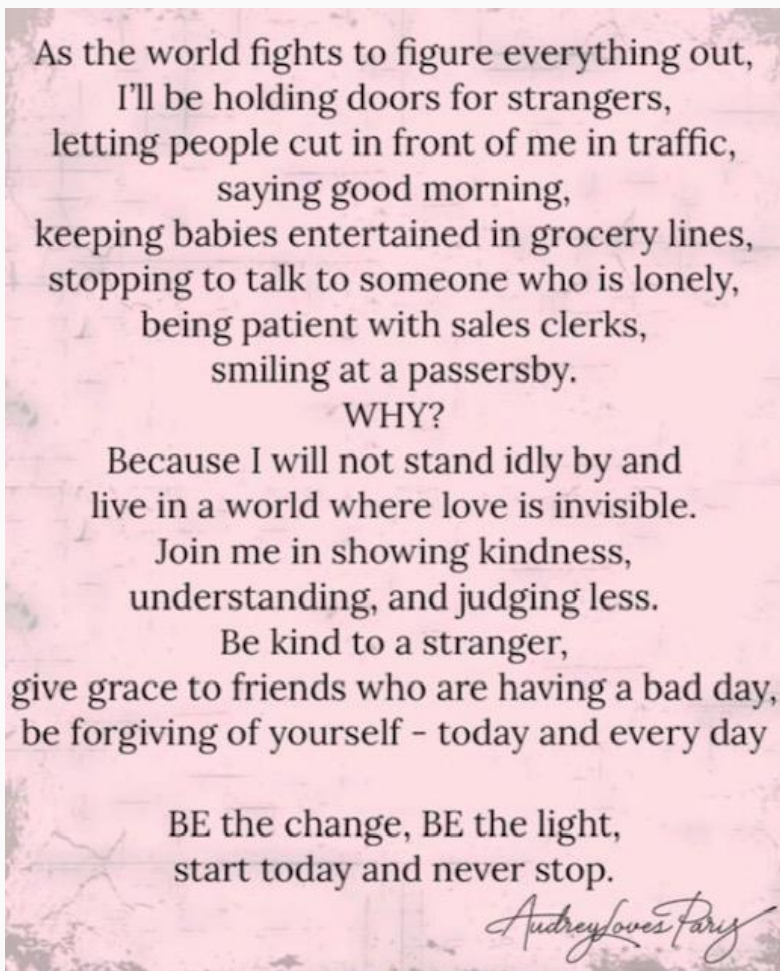
