Though it may be the middle of winter, the Ministry of Parks, Culture and Sport is already looking ahead to summertime. Planning is underway for the 2017 park season and campers will be able to book their provincial park campsites beginning Tuesday, April 4.

"Saskatchewan's provincial parks continue to grow in popularity, setting a new visitation record of nearly four million visits in 2016," Parks, Culture and Sport Minister Ken Cheveldayoff said. "We know that families are excited to plan their next visit and we look forward to providing them with the high quality experience they have come to expect."

As in past years, the launch will be staggered over a 10 day period, with different parks becoming available for reservations on different days. A queuing system will also be in place again this year to manage the high volume of traffic on the reservation website.

The 10 day launch and queuing system has been very effective at managing demand and ensuring the stability of the reservation system over the past three seasons. #### CHIEF PASKWA PICTOGRAPH NOW ON EXHIBIT AT THE ROYAL SASKATCHEWAN MUSEUM

The Royal Saskatchewan Museum (RSM) has launched a new temporary exhibit entitled *We Are All Treaty People*. This exhibit showcases the Chief Paskwa Pictograph, a two-panel graphite drawing that depicts the only known historical Indigenous perspective of Treaty Four.

The Chief Paskwa Pictograph appears to portray European and Aboriginal people engaged in treaty negotiations with a record of treaty promises and payments made between 1874 and 1883. The *We Are All Treaty People* exhibit also features a reproduction of the original hand-written version of Treaty Four. This temporary exhibit will eventually be replaced by a larger, permanent exhibit of the Chief Paskwa Pictograph.

"After working closely with the Pasqua First Nation, the Royal Saskatchewan Museum now displays an important and historic Indigenous depiction of Treaty Four," Parks, Culture and Sport Minister Ken Cheveldayoff said. "The Chief Paskwa Pictograph is significant to all Saskatchewan people in gaining a further understanding of our province's history."

For all of 2017 this pass gives you unlimited opportunities to enjoy National Parks, National Marine Conservation Areas and National Historic Sites across the country!

Please note:

- You only need to order one pass for your group or family if you are all travelling together. A 2017 Discovery Pass is valid for everyone arriving in the same vehicle at a national park, or arriving together at a marine conservation area or historic site.
- The Discovery Pass is only accepted at national historic sites which are operated by Parks Canada.
- Activities such as tours or parking that normally carry a separate fee may not be covered by the Discovery Pass.

- Camping fees are not included with the Discovery Pass
- Validity Period: January 1st 2017 to December 31st 2017.
- Display: The 2017 Discovery Pass must be hung from the rear view mirror of the vehicle facing forward or it can be placed on the front driver side dashboard facing up.

#### NEW RULES ON ACCESS TO BIRTH REGISTRATION NOW IN EFFECT FOR ADULT ADOPTEES AND BIRTH PARENTS

On January 1, new regulations came into effect to make it easier for adult adoptees and birth parents to access birth registration information.


The Government of Saskatchewan originally announced the changes in February 2016 to provide notice to individuals involved in the 37,000 adoptions that have occurred in Saskatchewan since 1922.

"Adoptees, their adoptive families and their birth families have been asking for us to improve access to birth registration information," Social Services Minister Tina Beaudry-Mellor said. "These changes will help support individuals involved in an adoption in learning more about their history, and even potentially strengthening their connections to their culture and birth family, if this is something they wish to move forward with."

## Optimizing and Integrating Patient-Centred Care



Change Will Reduce Administration While Improving Co-ordination of Health Services

Today, Health Minister Jim Reiter accepted all of the recommendations of the Saskatchewan Advisory Panel on Health System Structure, and announced the province will consolidate the 12 existing Regional Health Authorities (RHAs) into one single Provincial Health Authority.

"One Provincial Health Authority that is focussed on better co-ordination of health services across the province will improve the quality of care patients receive," Reiter said. "It will also reduce administration and duplication across the health system.

"This change represents a consolidation of administration, not a centralization of services. Our government remains committed to providing high-quality health services in every part of the province. Our goal is better co-ordination between the health services provided in different areas of the province."

Recognized for their leadership in the community, Harold Everett Chapman and Irene and Leslie Dubé were named as Members of the Order of Canada in the landmark 50th year awarding the honour.

"I am delighted to recognize these new recipients of the Order of Canada in this milestone year," Governor General David Johnston said in a release.

"Besides marking Canada's 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary, 2017 marks the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Order. So let's be inspired by the examples set by these remarkable Canadians and use this occasion to build a

smarter and more caring country in which every individual can succeed to the greatest extent possible."

Chapman is recognized for his leadership in the co-operative movement over the last 70 years, an experience he shared in his book, *Sharing My Life: Building the Co-operative Movement.* 

After growing the Concorde Group of Companies into a successful business, in 1993 Irene and Leslie Dubé decided to focus on giving back to the community through a variety of philanthropic works across Saskatchewan. Their generous donations and work in health care, education and community organizations has benefited the Royal University Hospital, Lighthouse Supported Living and the Ronald McDonald House Saskatchewan, among many others.

Created in 1967, the Order of Canada is meant to honour outstanding achievement, dedication to the community and service to Canada. Chapman and the Dubés join nearly 7,000 people from across the country also invested into the Order.

Saskatoon made an appearance in the New York Times' 52 Places to go in 2017! The Bridge City made an appearance in the New York Times' <u>52 Places to Go in 2017</u> – a feature long regarded by travellers as "the list."

"There is a perception outside of the Prairies, that Saskatoon has very little going on, when in fact we are a dynamic and growing city, with the youngest demographic in the country," said Aviva Kohen, media director at Tourism Saskatoon, in a news release Thursday.

Saskatoon is featured alongside the Louvre as a compelling art destination to visit.

"Remai Modern's opening in 2017 will be an exciting time in Saskatoon" said Gregory Burke, the gallery's executive director and CEO, in a news release Thursday.

"Our aim is to attract local, national and international visitors so we're thrilled to have been included in the New York Times' list of new museums opening this year."

Overall, Canada is number one on this year's list released online Thursday and in a special print edition slated for Sunday.

#### IMPROVING LOCAL ROADS AND BRIDGES IN SASKATCHEWAN'S URBAN MUNICIPALITIES

Investing in infrastructure is vital to strengthening the middle class and growing the economy. Modern and efficient community infrastructure like roads and bridges contributes to a high quality of life by helping connect people to jobs, supporting local businesses, and ensuring Canadians can spend less time on the road and more time with their families. Based on project planning in 2016, the federal Gas Tax Fund (GTF) supported 120 local road and bridge projects in Saskatchewan's urban municipalities.

"We need smart investments in safe and modern transportation infrastructure to support trade and create good, well-paying jobs that help the middle class prosper," said Ralph Goodale, Minister of Public Safety and Emergency Preparedness, on behalf of Amarjeet Sohi, Minister of Infrastructure and Communities. "Over a decade ago, as Finance Minister, I created the federal Gas Tax Fund to provide municipal governments with a new and substantial revenue stream to upgrade local infrastructure. It recognizes the importance of local decision-making, allowing Saskatchewan's urban municipalities to direct federal dollars to their priorities across a wide range of project


categories, including local roads and bridges, making a real difference in people's lives."

"Support for these types of projects demonstrates the province's commitment to make life better for our citizens and keep Saskatchewan strong," Government Relations Minister Donna Harpauer said. "Improving the roads, bridges and sidewalks in these communities increases the safety for both motorists and pedestrians, in addition to promoting the efficient movement of goods and services through our urban centres."
