STATEMENT FROM PREMIER BRAD WALL ON THE REJECTION OF KEYSTONE XL PIPELINE

November 6th announcement is very disappointing, not only for our energy sector but also for the signal it sends about Canada-US relations. Given the facts of the project as canvassed by the US State Department, this decision is more about US domestic politics than it is about good environmental policy.

The fact is pipelines are safer - far safer than other means of transporting oil, like rail. There are currently more than 66,000 miles of oil pipeline in the US with more than 12,000 miles - the equivalent of 10 Keystone XLs - built since 2010. Oil will move with or without pipelines. Consider the facts.

In 2008, there were 9,500 rail carloads of oil shipped in the US. By 2014, that number had jumped to 493,000 - more than 50 times as many. The US State Department even agrees that greenhouse gas emissions from rail are much higher than emissions from pipeline. Yet on Keystone XL, the US administration chose to put political interests ahead of the economic and environmental benefits that Keystone XL would provide

and ahead of its relationship with its most important trading partner, Canada.

This decision makes approval of Energy East even more crucial and it will be one of Saskatchewan's top priorities as we begin our work with the new federal government.

\$4.8 MILLION FOR SASKATOON POLICE SERVICE TARGETING POLICING INITIATIVES



I was pleased to join colleagues, the Honourable Christine Tell, Minister of Corrections and Policing and Paul Merriman, MLA, Saskatoon Sutherland at the Saskatoon Police Service Headquarters last week for the Municipal Police Grant announcement.

The Government of Saskatchewan is taking action to ensure the safety of Saskatoon communities and families by providing \$4.8 million in Municipal Police Grants to the Saskatoon Police Service (SPS).

This funding will support 42 SPS positions in 2015-16 and includes support for targeted initiatives such as the Police and Crisis Team, Combined Forces Special Enforcement Unit and the Serious and Habitual Offender Comprehensive Action Program.

"Our government is focused on community safety," Corrections and Policing Minister Christine Tell said. "This grant, and the positions it funds, provides the support needed to those working to protect Saskatoon communities and families."

NEW ESSENTIAL SERVICES LEGISLATION PASSES THIRD READING

The Government of Saskatchewan has passed the amendments to Part VII of *The Saskatchewan Employment Act*, which covers essential services and WHMIS, the workplace hazardous materials information system. The essential services amendments balance protecting the public and ensuring that alternative methods to settle labour disputes are available.

"We have always committed to working with public sector employers and the unions that represent their workers to find common ground so that our legislation not only addresses constitutional obligations but also ensures the provision of essential services for Saskatchewan citizens," Labour Relations and Workplace Safety Minister Don Morgan said. "As a result of working co-operatively with public sector employers, the unions that represent their workers and government representatives, we were able to find the right balance between protecting the public and ensuring that alternative methods to settle labour disputes are available."

SASKATOON HALL OF FAME INDUCTION DINNER




