REPORT FROM THE LEGISLATURE - STATEMENT FROM PREMIER BRAD WALL



TransCanada has cancelled its application to build the Energy East pipeline.

Energy East would have created thousands of jobs, contributed billions of dollars in tax revenue and boosted Canada's economy by around \$55 billion – all from exclusively private sector investment.

The federal government is blaming "business decisions" for the termination of Energy East. In reality, they have failed to champion this project and see it through for the benefit of all Canadians.

It is clear that the Trudeau government's energy policies, including their NDP-inspired carbon tax plan, are to blame for the death of the Energy East pipeline and Canada's energy independence.

The following is a statement from Premier Brad Wall:

Today is not a good day for Canada. It is not a good day for the federation. It is a very bad day for the west.

TransCanada made the decision to cancel Energy East – but make no mistake, the reasons for it fall at the feet of Prime Minister Justin Trudeau and the federal government. They have been, at best, ambivalent about the project and then moved the goalposts at the last moment by asking the regulator to consider the impact of upstream greenhouse gas emissions.

Imagine if something like this was considered prior to the construction of auto assembly plants in Ontario or the factories that manufacture heavily subsidized jets in Quebec or the highways and rails that transport those products.

Former federal Liberal Cabinet Minister, and now Montreal Mayor, Denis Coderre cheers the cancellation of this pipeline. He who leads a city that, just two years ago, used a pipeline to dump 4.9 BILLION litres, or nearly 2,000 Olympic-sized swimming pools, of raw sewage into the St. Lawrence Seaway.

It is a good thing that Mr. Coderre's hypocrisy needs no pipeline for conveyance, for it would need to be very large and could never get approved for construction.

When Coderre cheers for the end of this pipeline, he cheers for the imported oil we buy from Saudi Arabia, where women can now drive, but the public beheadings continue.

He is cheering against an energy sector in our country that employs thousands and has paid, on average, over the last three years \$17 billion annually in taxes and royalties to Canadian governments.

\$17 billion is enough to pay for 680 new schools, 1.8 million knee replacements and 4.25 million child care spaces. We have lost an opportunity to strengthen quality of life in Canada.

Beyond the immediate impact, there are other reasons to be concerned.

A new Liberal carbon tax, new Liberal tax changes for small business (that will hurt many in the energy sector and farmers), changes to the NEB applied only to this sector and not to others, and methane regulations that will not be mirrored south of the border, with whom we must compete for job creating investment dollars.

We have a company that committed more than a billion dollars to a project and made earnest efforts to address the concerns of the public and regulators. A company that made 700 changes to its plans as part of that response. Make no mistake, other companies' decisions to invest in Canada will be informed by this debacle.

The expectation of course from the federal government, and some powerful central Canadian interests, is that the west will just grin and bear this latest blow to our economy and our people. That our taxpayers in Saskatchewan and Alberta will continue to send, without question, about \$2.5 billion in equalization payments to help support Quebec that receives \$11 billion in equalization per year and \$1.4 billion to Ontario. All of this despite the fact that low energy prices have resulted in job losses and lower revenues for the last four years.

Something needs to change. For the west to continue on like this in our federal system is the equivalent of having Stockholm syndrome.

The decision by TransCanada to cancel the Energy East project was made because of a lack of interest and leadership – or worse, intentional decisions and policies of Prime Minister Justin Trudeau and his government. He should answer for this. He needs to be held accountable for this.

His actions and his government's actions may well have some westerners wondering if this country really values western Canada, the resources we have, and the things we do to contribute to the national economy and to quality of life for all.

AUGUST BUILDING PERMITS SECOND BEST IN THE NATION



Building permits in Saskatchewan took a big leap in August – rising 17.5 per cent over last August (seasonally adjusted) and well above the 0.6 per cent recorded nationally. Saskatchewan had the second highest percentage growth rate among the provinces.

"There was a significant jump in building permits in August which is good news for Saskatchewan," Economy Minister Steven Bonk said. "It translates into more jobs, more investment, and more growth for our economy."

Regina's building permits were up 25.2 per cent on a year-over-year basis, while Saskatoon's were up 20.6 per cent. Building permits totalled \$184 million in August. Residential permits rose 9.1 per cent, while non-residential permits were up 26.6 per cent.

Month-over-month, building permits were up 24.4 per cent, second highest percentage increase among the provinces and well ahead of the 5.5 per cent decline posted on a national basis.

CRESTLINE UNVEILS CANADA'S FIRST HYBRID AMBULANCE

Association of Paramedics Conference (OAPC) in Ottawa, Ontario. Attendees can view Crestline's revolutionary "green" ambulance today and tomorrow by visiting booth #115 at the Shaw Centre.

Crestline's Fleetmax XL3 Hybrid ambulance incorporates several "green" technologies, including the XL3 Hybrid System and ACETECH's ECO-Run module. The XL3 Hybrid System seamlessly installs onto original equipment manufacturer powertrains, using regenerative braking to help fleets increase fuel economy by 25%, lowering CO2 emissions by 20% while reducing its carbon footprint on the environment.

ACETECH ECO-Run module is an idle-management tool that eliminates excessive idling on scene. The module monitors battery levels and compartment temperatures, automatically shutting the engine off when they are at optimal levels. When levels fall below set parameters, the module turns the engine back on. The module also includes security and safety features, emergency override, driver control and administrative lockout. The ECO can be installed as a stand-alone module on new and existing ambulances.

Solar panels were installed onto the roof of the ambulance to assist in powering the lifesaving equipment onboard as well as the conversion batteries, resulting in less maintenance and further enhancing fuel economy.

Crestline worked in partnership with Oxford County Paramedic Services (Oxford County, Ontario) to develop and customize the two Fleetmax XL3 Hybrid ambulances specific for their fleet. With these technologies in place, Oxford will be able to capture a multitude of data in relation to fuel saving reports, engine run and idle times, in addition to being able to understand the amount of savings on carbon emissions and footprint. CROP REPORT FOR THE PERIOD SEPTEMBER 26 TO OCTOBER 2, 2017



Warm and dry weather earlier in the week allowed many producers to return to the field after several days of rain delays. Eighty-nine per cent of the crop is now in the bin, up from 78 per cent last week. Harvest progress remains ahead of the five year (2012-2016) average of 82 per cent for this time of year. Eight per cent of the crop is swathed or ready to straight-cut.

Harvest is most advanced in the southwestern region, where 98 per cent of the crop is now combined. The southeastern and west-central regions have 92 per cent combined and the east-central region 89 per cent. The northeastern region has 78 per cent combined, while the northwestern region has 69 per cent combined.

Many producers worked long hours over the last week to combine remaining crops prior to the rain. Some crops have been taken off tough and placed into aeration bins.

"Motorists travelling to visit family and friends this Thanksgiving weekend are reminded to continue watching for work zones," Highways and Infrastructure Minister David Marit said. "Remember to slow to 60 km/hr when approaching the work zone and watch for flaggers, signs, equipment and other hazards."

UNEMPLOYMENT RATE DROPS IN SEPTEMBER

Saskatchewan's unemployment rate in September was 6.2 per cent (seasonally adjusted), down from 6.4 per cent a month ago and 6.9 per cent from September 2016.

"Recent economic indicators showed that Saskatchewan is leading the nation in growth in wholesale trade and manufacturing sales, as well as having the second-highest retail sales growth rate, and we are beginning to see the effects of that in our economy," Economy Minister Steven Bonk said. "What is encouraging about today's job numbers is that unemployment rates are down both month-to-month and year-over-year, and that full-time jobs increased over last year."

There were 1,600 full-time jobs created in Saskatchewan year-over-year, while part-time employment decreased by 3,000 for a net employment decline of 1,400.

Nationally, the unemployment rate in September was 6.2 per cent.

Opening the Door for Women

The Government of Saskatchewan is pleased to join with the federal government and other provinces in celebrating Women's History Month.

Women's History Month, celebrated each year in October, marks the anniversary of the "Persons Case" of 1929, in which Canadian women were formally recognized as "persons" under the law.

This year, the focus is on women in the economy.

As of 2016, Saskatchewan women make up 51 per cent of the population and bring their own unique perspectives to social, economic, political and public policy issues. In 2015, the employment rate for women in Saskatchewan was 76.3 per cent, highest among the provinces. Women had the strongest representation in the health care, social services, education and retail trade sectors.

"Our government is proud to support Women's History Month and to celebrate the vital role women play in the workforce," Minister responsible for the Status of Women Bronwyn Eyre said. "In Saskatchewan, we have a lot to celebrate."

The number of women working in Saskatchewan in 2015 was 263,100, up seven per cent from 2010.

"Women in Saskatchewan are strong contributors to our province's prosperity, and are a vital part of its growth," Economy Minister Steven Bonk said. "In addition, through their various roles across our diverse economy, Saskatchewan women provide goods, services and countless opportunities that enhance the quality of life and standard of living for all who live here."
