OPENING OF THE SECOND SESSION OF THE TWENTY-EIGHTH LEGISLATURE



The public is invited to an outdoor ceremony on October 25 when Lieutenant Governor Vaughn Solomon Schofield will formally open the Second Session of the Twenty-Eighth Legislature with the Speech from the Throne at the Saskatchewan Legislature.

"The traditions surrounding the opening of our Legislative Assembly go back to the foundation of our democracy and are indicative of the importance of our democratic institutions," Solomon Schofield said. "I'm grateful the Government of Saskatchewan continues to carry out these traditions and I encourage the public to join us on this important day."

The public is invited to attend the outdoor portion of the ceremony, which begins at 1:25 p.m. in front of the Legislative Building at 2405 Legislative Drive. Her Honour will be greeted by Premier Brad Wall and Provincial Secretary Nadine Wilson. The ceremony also includes a Royal Salute, the inspection of a Canadian Forces Guard of Honour, a 15 Gun Salute by the 10th Field Artillery – 38 Canadian Brigade Group, and a flypast by 15 Wing Moose Jaw.

"This tradition is an integral and unique part of Saskatchewan's history," Wall said. "It is important that we mark this important day before the House gets down to doing the work that will keep our province strong."

The formal opening of the Legislative Assembly has taken place to mark each session since 1906, when representatives of the Legislature, the Executive and the Judiciary first gathered to hear Lieutenant Governor Amédee Forget.

TEMPORARY MENTAL HEALTH ASSESSMENT UNIT APPROVED FOR THE ROYAL UNIVERSITY HOSPITAL



People needing urgent mental health care in Saskatoon will soon have access to a new unit while being assessed at the Royal University Hospital (RUH) ER. The Saskatoon Health Region is establishing a temporary mental health assessment unit in Saskatoon. This unit will be renovated with a generous \$1 million donation from the Dubé family through the Royal University Hospital Foundation.

The new unit will be in operation until the new Jim Pattison Children's Hospital (JPCH) is opened in late 2019, as the JPCH adult emergency room will include private spaces that are more suitable to mental health emergency care, in addition to mental health assessment services.

"Our government recognizes the importance of providing appropriate and timely access to mental health services," Health Minister Jim Reiter said. "We commend the efforts of the RUH Foundation and its donors in raising funds for this project and their commitment to improving emergency services for those facing mental health issues. We also thank the Dubé family for their incredibly generous donation for this project."

ENTREPRENEURSHIP AND VOLUNTEERISM BEGINS AT AN EARLY AGE IN SASKATCHEWAN!




Entrepeneurship and volunteerism starts at an early age in Saskatchewan.

FLU VACCINATIONS AVAILABLE OCTOBER 23



The publicly-funded influenza (flu) vaccine will be offered in Saskatchewan beginning October 23 through public health clinics, some physician and Nurse Practitioner offices, and participating pharmacies.

The free flu shot is offered to residents six months and older, and is highly recommended for people at high risk of complications from influenza.

"Influenza can cause serious illness in seniors, people with chronic health conditions, young children and pregnant women," Saskatchewan's Chief Medical Health Officer Dr. Saqib Shahab said. "Seniors have the highest risk of complications, hospitalization or death from influenza. I strongly encourage everyone at high risk to get a flu shot early in the season and be protected before the virus begins to circulate widely."

STUDENTS FROM THE START







CROP REPORT FOR THE PERIOD OCTOBER 10 TO 16, 2017



Harvest is essentially complete for producers in the province, with 98 per cent of the crop now in the bin, up from 94 per cent last week, according to Saskatchewan Agriculture's Weekly Crop Report. The five year (2012-2016) average for this time of year is 94 per cent harvested. There are still some crops, such as flax, soybean and canola, left to harvest, and most of these producers will only need another week or two of warm and dry conditions to finish.

The southeastern, southwestern and east-central regions all have 99 per cent of the crop combined, while the west-central region has 98 per cent. The northeastern region has 96 per cent of the crop in the bin and the northwestern region has 95 per cent.

Ninety-nine per cent of canaryseed, 98 per cent of durum, spring wheat, oats and barley, 95 per cent of canola, 91 per cent of soybeans and 87 per cent of flax have been combined.

SURVEY FOR HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE PROGRAM LAUNCHED DURING WASTE REDUCTION WEEK

The Government of Saskatchewan is requesting public feedback on a recycling program for household hazardous waste in Saskatchewan. The online survey has been launched this week during Waste Reduction Week, which was proclaimed by Environment Minister Dustin Duncan.

"As we celebrate and recognize Waste Reduction Week, we're asking residents to provide feedback on a potential program that results in effective, successful and safe hazardous material recycling," Duncan said. "This week is an opportunity for everyone in Saskatchewan to focus on recycling and reducing waste and we will continue to work to provide programming to accomplish this."

The potential recycling program would provide ways for residents to recycle hazardous materials, in addition to the province's many existing recycling programs. Examples of hazardous materials include pesticides, pharmaceutical products, natural health products, fluorescent lighting tubes and compact fluorescent lights, batteries, smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors. The goal is to develop a program that meet the needs of Saskatchewan residents and are harmonized with other jurisdictions in western Canada. Recycling or responsible disposal of these types of products and

containers will help to protect Saskatchewan's soil, air and water.






