REPORT FROM LEGISLATURE

- An important facet of Keeping the Saskatchewan Advantage is properly funding services that are important to Saskatchewan people.
- Keeping the Saskatchewan Advantage is also about investing in the future. To that end, we are providing \$1 million for a project at the U of R which will include student housing, child care and other amenities, including increased parking. Over the past four years, we have increased our investment in student housing by more than 3,000 per cent today, there are more than 1,000 new beds for students across the province. Promise made, promise kept.
- Saskatchewan residents created the Saskatchewan Advantage, which includes creating the business environment that has the world looking at our province as the best place to invest. On March 20, Glencore International, in a deal that includes two Canadian companies, announced its takeover bid for Regina-based Viterra, a leader in the international grain marketing industry. At

that time, Premier Brad Wall announced that just like during the proposed potash takeover, we would conduct a very thorough analysis to determine whether this deal was also in the best interest of Saskatchewan people. On March 29, the Premier announced that Informa Economics would conduct an independent review looking at all aspects of the deal, including employment and what effect it might have on the province's economy and revenues. The deadline for their report is May 7 – it will be released to the public a few days later.

- More good news on the job front. According to a new StatsCan report, average weekly earnings in Saskatchewan are at an all-time high of \$907.44. That's an increase of 2.7 per cent over where we were at the same time last year. And, if the latest number of hits on Saskjobs.ca is any indication, people around the world know that Saskatchewan is **the** place to build a career. There were more than a million hits on the website in March. Close to 14,000 of those visits came from Ireland further proof that Premier Brad Wall and Employment Immigration Minister Rob Norris' recruitment mission to the Emerald Isle last month continues to pay off.
- For the entire month of May, seniors can ride anywhere on the STC bus network for only \$10 one-way. Spring in Saskatchewan is a beautiful season to enjoy time with friends and families in our great province —by providing this service we give seniors an opportunity to do just that.

SCOTIABANK HOLDS ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING IN SASKATOON

Deputy Premier and Minister of Finance, Ken Krawetz and I had the privilege of attending a reception with hundreds of executives and employees from Scotiabank Canada Monday, April 2.

INCREASED FUNDING SUPPORTS BETTER ACCESS TO CANCER CARE

Saskatchewan cancer patients will have improved access to cancer care and services, thanks to a funding increase this year to the Saskatchewan Cancer Agency.

The provincial government committed \$138.8 million for the agency in the 2012-13 Budget, an increase of \$16.9 million (nearly 14 per cent) over 2011-12. It will be used to enhance access to cancer screening, cancer drugs and oncologists.

"We're committed to giving Saskatchewan people the best cancer care available anywhere," Health Minister Don McMorris said. "The Saskatchewan Cancer Agency is doing an exceptional job providing services to patients, and its focus on improving access to cancer care is clearly paying off." Saskatchewan Cancer Agency data shows that patients are getting more timely appointments with oncologists at the cancer centres.

The week of March 30 to April 5 was officially proclaimed as Pink Revolution Anti-bullying Week. The Ministry of Education is demonstrating its support for anti-discrimination efforts with a focus on events and initiatives coinciding with this officially proclaimed week.

Pink Revolution Week kicked off in Saskatoon on March 12 and had a subsequent flag raising ceremony on April 1. This Saskatchewan made event was co-ordinated by the Anti-bullying Network, which is comprised of the Boys and Girls Club, The Avenue Community Centre, Youth Launch, Restorative Action Program, Saskatoon Police Service, Affinity Credit Union, and various local school divisions. Ministry officials attended both the launch and the flag raising to offer greetings and show support.

SASKATCHEWAN WITH LOWEST UNEMPLOYMENT RATE IN THE COUNTRY

Saskatchewan's unemployment rate in March 2012 was 4.8 per cent, down from 5.0 per cent in February.

The province's jobless rate was the lowest in the country and well below the national unemployment rate of 7.2 per cent.

Regina's unemployment rate of 3.9 per cent was lowest among major Canadian cities while Saskatoon at 5.9 per cent was ninth lowest.

"With these positive job numbers, a growing population and record high earnings for workers, we are continuing to build momentum for the rest of the year," Advanced Education, Employment and Immigration Minister Rob Norris said. "Confidence in our economy is strong. More Saskatchewan businesses are looking to hire new workers immediately and in the long term."

SAID APPLICATION REMINDER

The Government of Saskatchewan has committed to expanded enrolment and substantial increases to the Saskatchewan Assured Income for Disability (SAID) benefit. In addition to the \$50 increase in January 2012, there will be increases of \$100 per month over four years for those living in residential care, \$350 per month over four years for those in independent living arrangements, and \$400 per month over four years for couples with disabilities who are living independently.

Between March 12 and 30, 12,000 application and assessment packages were mailed out across the province in order to help expand the SAID program and increase enrolment from the current caseload of 3,500 people. These assessments are underway with enrolment and new benefits scheduled to begin June 2012.

All individuals currently receiving a disability benefit through the Saskatchewan Assistance Program (SAP) are reminded to complete and return their application and disability impact assessment packages as soon as possible to determine if they are eligible for the SAID program.

"The SAID program expansion is one way that this government is helping to make Saskatchewan the best place in Canada to live for people with disabilities," Social Services Minister June Draude said. "In order to ensure we include as many qualified people as possible in the enhanced program, it is vital that these assessment packages are completed."

Drop-in sessions for people who want help filling out their SAID application and assessment forms will be held in Regina and Saskatoon over the next couple of weeks.
